1. Buswell, James O., Jr., A Systematic Theology of the Christian Religion. Zondervan, 1962.
Pages 134-162 of Volume I deal with the creative days. An earlier version of this work of Buswell's is reprinted as an appendix in Pattle P. T. Pun, 1982 (See Pun, below).
 2. Cain, Dallas E., Creation and Capron's Explanatory Interpretation: A Literature Search. Interdisciplinary Biblical Research Institute, P. O. Box 423, Hatfield, PA 19440, 1986, Research Report no. 27, 24 p., \$2.00.
 3. Custance, A. C., Without Form and Void. Brockville, Ontario: Doorway Publications, 1970, 211 p. (out-of-print)
A scholarly defense of an early original creation, from the Hebrew text.
 4. Dana, James D., "Creation: Or, the Biblical Cosmogony in the Light of Modern Science." Bibliotheca Sacra, v. 42 (1880), p. 201-224.
According to John D. Hannah, in an article in Grace Journal, v. 4, no. 1, 1983, Dana, in later life--especially after 1880--accepted a considerable number of the tenets of Darwinism. But, during most of his life he was a strong defender of special creation, e. g., in several short articles in Bibliotheca Sacra, v. 13 (1856), and v. 14 (1857). He championed the day-age view of creation.
 5. Dawson, J. W. ("Sir Wm"), "Points of Contact Between Science and Revelation." Princeton Review, v. 4, 1879, p. 579-606.
 6. Dawson, J. W. ("Sir Wm"), The Origin of the World According to Revelation and Science. London: Hodder and Stoughton, 7th edition, 1898. (An earlier edition was published by Harper Bros in New York in 1877.)
 7. Gange, Robert A., Origins and Destiny. Word Books, 1986.
Gange is a physicist, and Director of The Genesis Foundation, of Princeton, N. J.
 7. Guyot, Arnold, Creation. New York: Scribner, 1884.
Guyot was Professor of Geology at Princeton University. He defended old-earth creation doctrine both from geological evidences and from the Hebrew text.
 9. Hayward, Alan, Creation and Evolution: the Facts and Fallacies. Triangle/SPEK, available in U. S. from Fortress Press, 1985, 232 p. \$4.95.
A carefully written work, representing good scholarship--though written in semi-popular style. This work is especially useful because it gives extensive and good-quality evidences against both macroevolution and young-earth creationism. The publisher, unfortunately, greatly cheapened the format of the book, and omitted the photographic plates to save expense.

10. Hitchcock, Edward, The Religion of Geology and its Connected Sciences. Boston: Phillips, Sampson, & Co., 1851, 510 p.
Hitchcock was a well-known geologist, president of Amherst College, and defender of old-earth creation doctrine.
11. Lewis, Tayler, The Six Days of Creation. Schenectady: Van DeBogert, 1855.
See the comments concerning Lewis's work in Davis Young, 1982, p. 58. Lewis's work on the days of creation was very thorough and scholarly. However, the above-named book set forth a (conservative) theistic evolutionary view of the origin of animals and man. (On this aspect of Lewis's belief, see p. 44-46 of the article by John D. Hanna in Grace Journal, v. 4, no. 1, 1983, p. 37-58.
12. Maatman, Russell W., The Bible, Natural Science, and Evolution. Dordt College Press, 1970, 165 p. Recently reprinted and available at \$4.50.
I have found this book to be of high quality and very useful.
13. Miller, Hugh, The Testimony of the Rocks. Boston: Gould & Lincoln, 1858, 502 p.
Miller was a well-known geologist, conservative Christian leader, and defender of old-earth creation doctrine. *Reprinted by J. B. Alden Co., of N. Y., 1892*
14. Montgomery, John W., ed, (a forthcoming book on Christian evidences, in which Robert C. Newman will have an article on evidences for an old earth).
15. Moore, J. R., "Charles Lyell and the Noachian Deluge," Jour of the Amer Sci Affil, v. 22 (1970), p. 107-115.
Since the publication of this article, Moore has come out in favor of theistic evolution.
16. Newman, Robert C., and Eckelmann, H. J., Genesis One and the Origin of the Earth. IVP, 1977 (and Baker Book House, 1981), (out-of-print) 154 p.
This book relates the evidences for age from astrophysics, to the text of Chapter 1 of Genesis. Also 47 pages of appendices of other types of evidence for age.
17. Pun, Pattle, P. T., Evolution: Nature and Science in Conflict?. Zondervan, 1982, 336 p., \$11.95.
Helpful material on the age of the earth is found on p. 251-271 and 301-313. Also on p. 55-80, though this section was unfortunately placed under the heading, "Evidence for Evolution." I consider this to be a very useful book. Said to be going out of print. (Like most other old-earth-creationist books, it is hardly sensational enough for the major evangelical publishers' present interests.)
18. Ramm, Bernard, The Christian View of Science and Scripture, Eerdmans, 1954, \$4.95. (Still available, at least from the ASA, P. O. Box 668, Ipswich, MA 01938)
19. Reno, Cora A., Evolution on Trial, Moody Press, 1970, 192 p.
A thorough and scholarly revision of Reno's earlier work which Moody Press published. Unfortunately the revision was allowed to quickly go out-of-print when Moody Press turned to favor young-earth creationism in the early 1970's.
20. Wonderly, Daniel E., God's Time-Records in Ancient Sediments. Crystal Press, 1909 Proctor St., Flint, MI 48504, 1977, 258 p., \$7.00.
Concentrates on widely-known, positive, non-radiometric evidences for great age. Cites many research reports from sedimentary geology and oceanography.
21. Wonderly, Daniel E., Neglect of Geologic Data: Sedimentary Strata Compared With Young-Earth Creationist Writings. Interdisciplinary Biblical Research Institute, P. O. Box 423, Hatfield, PA 19440, in press, 140 p. (approx.).
A highly documented critique of some of the parts of young-earth creationist writings which are specifically related to geology.

22. Young, Davis A., Creation and The Flood: An Alternative to Flood Geology and Theistic Evolution. Baker, 1977, 217 p., \$6.95, (Still available, at least from ASA)
23. Young, Davis A., Christianity and the Age of the Earth. Zondervan, 1982, 188 p. (Out of print)
24. Youngblood, Ronald, ed., The Genesis Debate: Persistent Questions about Creation and the Flood. Thomas Nelson, 1986, \$12.95. (Papers by 22 theologians of various views. Robert C. Newman is one of them.)
I have not seen this book. Some of the authors may recommend theistic evolution.
